Adoption

Warm-Up Questions:

 What difference does having a good father make in a child's life?
What are some of the issues that might arise from bad fatherhood?

Read Romans 8:14-17

I. Adoption: The Facts (Rom. 8:14)

A. It's Supernatural (Jn. 1:12)

 What would you say to someone who says "we are all God's children"?

B. It's Secured (Gal. 4:4-5)

- If you were to die today and stand before God, and he says, "why should I let you in to my heaven," what would you say?
- The confession teaches that we are adopted not only in Jesus but for him. We are the treasure and reward that he died for.
 How does it make you feel to know that you are his reward?

C. Its Evidence (Eph. 5:1)

 What are some ways God might be calling you to imitate his adoptive love?

II. Adoption: The Benefits (Rom. 8:15-17a)

A. Intimacy (Rom. 8:15b)

- Read Rom. 8:15b, Eph. 3:12, Heb. 4:16. Gal. 4:6. What difference might truly believing that God is a loving Father make for your relationship with him?
- B. Fathering (Heb. 12:5b, 6a)
- Where have you experienced the fatherly discipline of God in your life?
- C. Security (Rom. 8:15-16)
- What comfort does Rom. 8:15-16 provide if we are struggling with believing we are God's children (hint: look at the legal language)? (See also Eph. 1:3, 4:30)
- D. Status (Rom. 8:17)
- What new status do we have as God's children? (See also 1 Pet 1:3-4)

Going Deeper:

Read and discuss chapter 12 of The Westminster Confession and questions 34 and 36 of the Westminster Shorter Catechism, along with some of the Scripture proofs. Then, as a group:

- Spend time summarizing/rewording the question and answer
- Discuss how the Scripture proofs support the answer

Action:

 Spend time this week praying for opportunities to imitate God's adoptive love to those who cross your path.
