WCF XXI: Of Religious Worship & The Sabbath Day

Warm-Up Question:

What are some amazing things in life that should inspire more awe and wonder, but are easily overlooked in everyday life?

READ: Psalm 29:1-2; 95:6-7; Revelation 5:13-14

I. Worship: The PRESCRIPTION

- ▶ From WCF 21 & passages above, what's a good definition for worship?
- ▶ If everyone is a worshipper, name some things people in our culture worship? What are the signs that someone (or we) might be worshipping something else beside God?

II. Worship: The PRACTICE

- Describe how you could grow in coming to worship with more:
 - 1. Engagement: Allowing your heart to come prepared and engaged?
 - 2. <u>Truth</u>: Focusing your mind with a desire to grow & learn?
 - 3. <u>Humility</u>: Looking for God to bring conviction of your sin?
 - 4. Self-Denial: Willing for God to interrupt your life?

IIII. Worship: The PRIORITY

- Discuss how you're doing in your private daily worship of God. What do you need to do to grow in this?
- Do you come to worship expecting for God to change you? How has God changed you over the last year or few years through worship?
- How does God use worship to remind you who we are and what He has done for us in Christ? How does that encourage you to worship?

WCF XXI

- 1. The light of nature shows that there is a God who has lordship and sovereignty over all, is good and does good to all, and is therefore to be feared, loved, praised, called on, trusted in, and served with all one's heart, with all one's soul, and with all one's might. But the acceptable way of worshipping the true God is instituted by himself and is limited to his own revealed will. Therefore he may not be worshipped according to the imaginations and inventions of mankind or the suggestions of Satan, in any visible representation, or in any other way not prescribed in the holy Scriptures.
- 2. Religious worship is to be given to God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and to him alone, not to angels, saints, or to any other creature. Also, since the fall of mankind, worship cannot occur without a mediator, nor in the mediation of anyone other than Christ alone.
