Jesus is Better — Hebrews 10:26-39

Warm-Up Question:

Have you seen anyone endure suffering in a way that has helped you later endure through suffering as well? Explain how their example encouraged you.

READ: Hebrews 10:26-39

I. THE APOSTATE

- The word "deliberately" in v. 26 indicates intentional & bold sin. Discuss what this (& "setting aside the law of Moses" v. 27-28) might look like in one's life.
- ▶ What are the implications and result of doing this from v. 26-30?
- ▶ What does this say about the nature of God & seriousness of sin (v. 30-31)?
- What should these truths invoke in the heart of a true Christian? In you?

II. THE ENDURER

- ▶ What's the difference in true Christians from v. 32 & 39? What do they have?
- What is the fruit of a Christian's faith from v. 32-34? Discuss what they did and what it says about what they believe about Christ.
- ▶ How has your faith been challenged to endure in the midst of suffering?

III. THE SAVIOR

- ▶ Read Heb. 12:2-3 and then 1 Peter 2:19-24. Describe how Jesus endured suffering for you. What does that say about his heart for you?
- ▶ How does that motivate you to follow in his example, to endure suffering, and to fight against deliberate sinning without repentance?

What is one main take-away you want to apply in your life this week?

For Prayer:

- Praise Jesus for the way he suffered for you.
- Pray any who are struggling in their faith, whether from sin or suffering.
- Pray for strength to endure suffering and treasure Christ above all else in the midst of it.



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Scriptures Used

Heb. 10:26 For if we go on sinning deliberately after receiving the knowledge of the truth, there no longer remains a sacrifice for sins, **27** but a fearful expectation of judgment, and a fury of fire that will consume the adversaries. **28** Anyone who has set aside the law of Moses dies without mercy on the evidence of two or three witnesses. **29** How much worse punishment, do you think, will be deserved by the one who has trampled underfoot the Son of God, and has profaned the blood of the covenant by which he was sanctified, and has outraged the Spirit of grace? **30** For we know him who said, "Vengeance is mine; I will repay." And again, "The Lord will judge his people." **31** It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

Heb. 10:32 But recall the former days when, after you were enlightened, you endured a hard struggle with sufferings, **33** sometimes being publicly exposed to reproach and affliction, and sometimes being partners with those so treated. **34** For you had compassion on those in prison, and you joyfully accepted the plundering of your property, since you knew that you yourselves had a better possession and an abiding one. **35** Therefore do not throw away your confidence, which has a great reward. **36** For you have need of endurance, so that when you have done the will of God you may receive what is promised. **37** For,

"Yet a little while, and the coming one will come and will not delay;

but my righteous one shall live by faith, and if he shrinks back, my soul has no pleasure in him."

Heb. 10:39 But we are not of those who shrink back and are destroyed, but of those who have faith and preserve their souls.

Heb. 12:1 Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, **2** looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

1 Peter 2:19 For this is a gracious thing, when, mindful of God, one endures sorrows while suffering unjustly. 20 For what credit is it if, when you sin and are beaten for it, you endure? But if when you do good and suffer for it you endure, this is a gracious thing in the sight of God. 21 For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps. 22 He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. 23 When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly. 24 He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. 25 For you were straying like sheep, but have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls.
